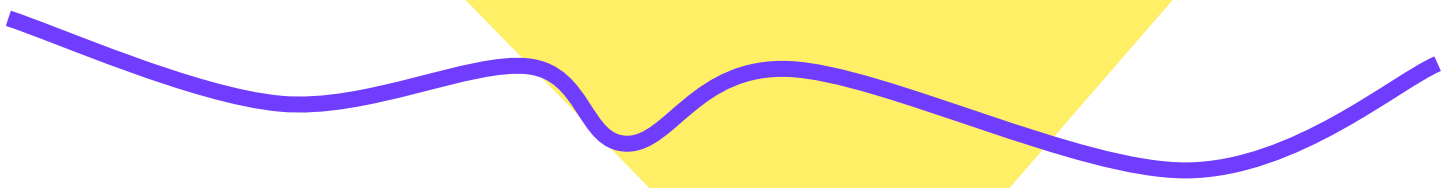
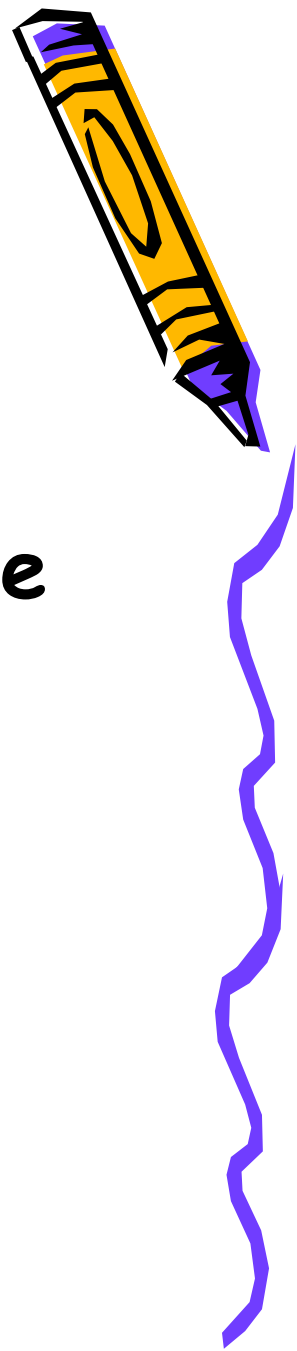

TACA Atatürk School provides education to Turkish children in the Chicago area following Atatürk's principles... and at no tuition for TACA members!

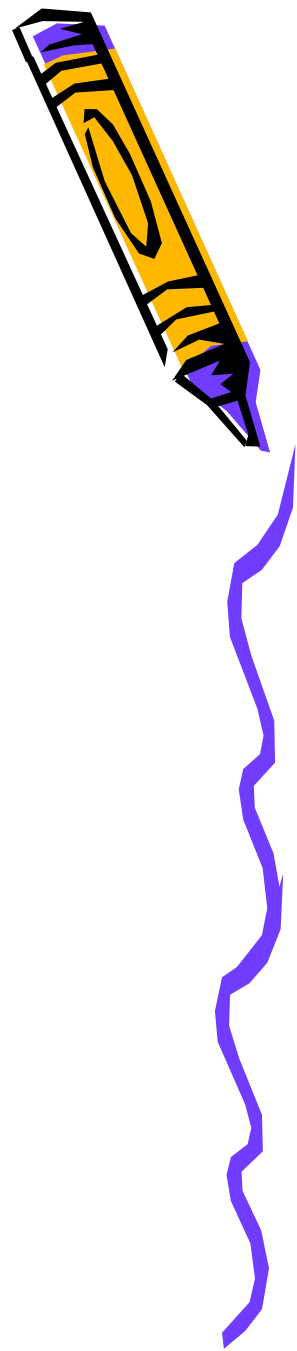


When are classes held?

...and so much more!

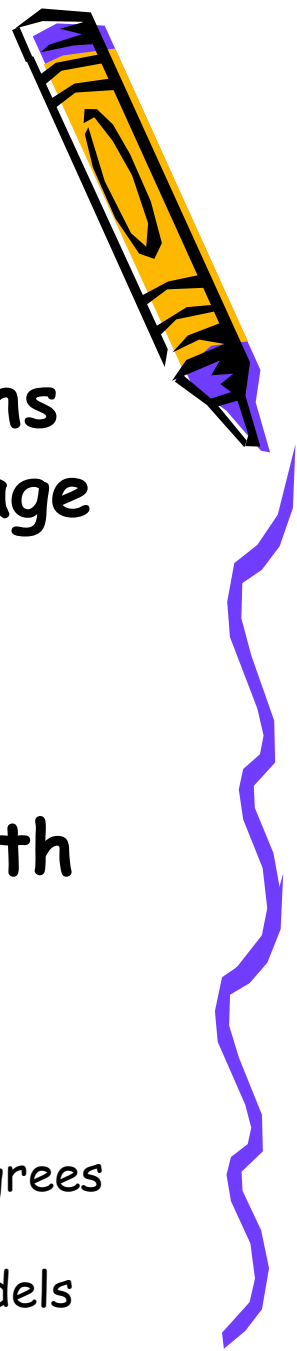

Our Teachers

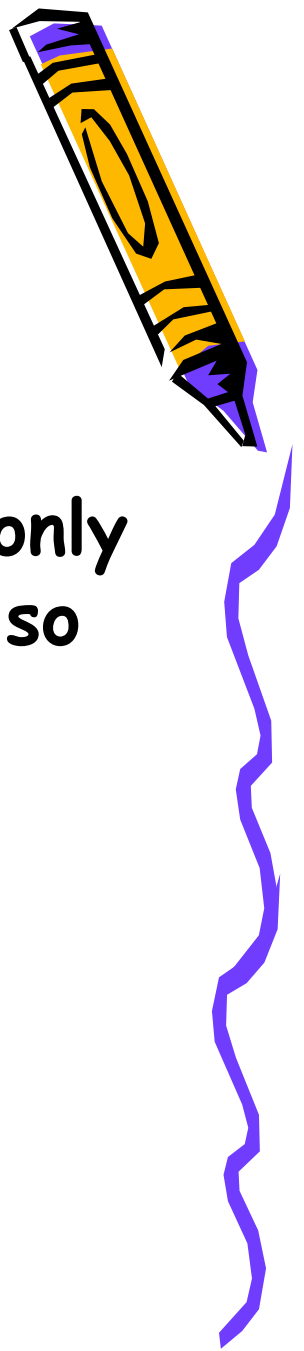
